Johnston.

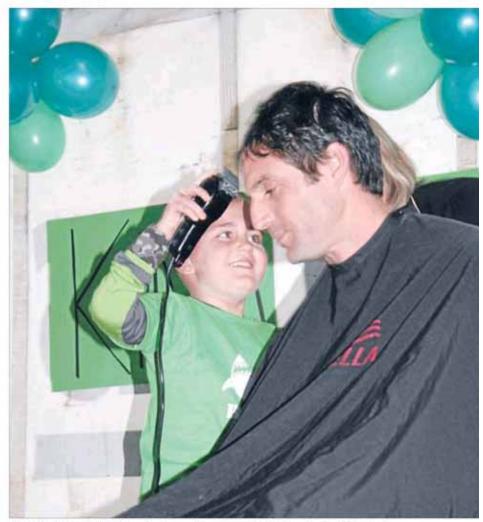
Mr Gardiner says he was amazed by the turn out and support by the community, "it's fantastie".
